Profile of Kilmurry National School

Kilmurry National School is a six-teacher school serving the community of Kilmurry and the surrounding area. Currently, there are 125 pupils on roll in the school.

Kilmurry National School continues a long tradition of educational provision in the locality. In the mid 1840's a hedge school operated from the porch of the church. Today's school grew from the National School which was established in 1891. New classrooms were added in 1999 and 2006.

The school is a hive of activity throughout the year. The staff, pupils and community are particularly proud of the long sporting and musical heritage of the school. In recent years, the school has won a number of camogie and basketball competitions.

In 2008 the school community came together to celebrate the achievement of its first Green Flag. This was a source of great joy and welcome recognition of how we look after our school building. Parents, pupils, teachers and all school staff work closely to preserve and develop our facilities.

Kilmurry National School works closely with St. Finnachta's National School and the parish team in the preparation of the children for sacraments. We travel to Esker Retreat Centre as part of our confirmation preparation. In 2008, we raised over €1,100 for Trócaire as part of our sacramental preparation in second and sixth classes.

Building Community in St Finnachta's NS, Sixmilebridge

Sixmilebridge NS currently has 370 pupils on roll. We have a staff of 21 teachers which is complemented by our SNAs, secretary, caretaker and cleaners. This school team is supported by an enthusiastic Board of Management and a vibrant Parents' Association.

Pupil enrolments have increased by 40% in the past four years and could increase by a further 40% in the next four years. We are extremely fortunate in the school to have such a hard working team of teachers, SNAs and ancillary staff. The team gives of its best to ensure that the school provides a wonderful education to the pupils in a pleasant, safe and happy environment which is imbued by our Catholic ethos. We have been promised a new school building to cater for the increasing pupil numbers - however we have no indication of when this building might be delivered. In the meantime prefabs are being installed on an annual basis to cater for the increased enrolments. While pupil accommodation is undoubtedly a challenge, building a sense of community in a growing school is a greater challenge.

In the school, one of our key aims is to instil a spirit of community and a sense of belonging among the pupils and staff. To do this we focus on our own school community and on building links with the broader community in Sixmilebridge. The school year starts with a Mass to which all classes contribute. Within the school we hold monthly assemblies for the pupils. The format of the assembly is to begin with a prayer, followed by an opportunity to acknowledge personal achievements of individual pupils. Classes then have an opportunity to showcase to each other the work that they have been doing in their classes over the previous month. We also use the 'Pupil of the Week' award in all classes. The awards are announced on the school intercom each Friday and the pupil's photographs are then displayed for the coming week. Our monthly newsletter also contributes to building a sense of community in the school. These newsletters are written and produced by sixth class pupils and report on all school activities from the perspective of the pupils. A sense of teamwork is fostered among the school staff through regular staff meetings, in-service training, staff workshops and a team based approach to school planning.

This year we have four teachers directly involved with the preparation of pupils for the sacraments of Reconciliation, First confession and Confirmation. However, pupils and teachers across all classes will be involved through facilitating the school choir and through assistance with preparations. We have further links with the broader community through the involvement of community representatives on the Board of Management, Green Schools Committee and liaison with our Junior Warden scheme. This year we have been fortunate to have members of the community come to the school to assist with knitting classes for pupils. Thanks to the generosity of local sporting organisations, classes have also benefited from sports coaching by local volunteers. Through all of these links and activities it is hoped that pupils will experience community in their school and see their school as part of a local community.

The school is constantly evolving. Through that evolution we need to build upon the things that have always been good in the school - this can best be achieved by building our sense of community!



Kilmurry Children's Liturgy Group



The Children's Liturgy Group which began in Kilmurry last year has been very successful to date. We're still finding our feet, but we've been overwhelmed by the number of children who've been attending our sessions. (Up to 50 children) The sessions take place on week nights and last for an hour.

Our hope when we began was to gather children together so they could experience faith and fun. Learning is much easier when it's fun, and this holds especially true for children. What we offer them is a place where they can learn about their faith, ask questions about it, make friends and become familiar and comfortable with their local Church.

Because we've had such big numbers coming to the liturgy sessions we have to split the groups to make it manageable. We've been very lucky that some of the local secondary school students have gotten involved. They come down and help out, telling stories to younger children and helping the older ones doing activities.

We've had a couple of Children's Masses during the year too, which have been great as the kids get to apply what they've learned and be a real part of the Mass through reading, singing, and bringing up gifts. Our hope is that as they learn more, Mass will have more meaning for them. For us the best thing about what we're doing is the impact, which has many levels. Obviously the children are enjoying it, they're learning more about their faith and getting to know each other better. Hopefully it's impacting on parents too, as their children will want to talk about what they've learned, and this gives parents a chance to talk to their children about faith and values.

The secondary school students are learning too, they're given responsibility and they're learning about working with children and with groups. In a culture that's so focused on "me, me, me", we have to celebrate teenagers who give up "Eastenders" in favour of volunteering to help out with children in their Church! It also impacts on the community as a whole, as we've had a very positive response from people who've attended the Children's Masses.

There were a series of sessions that took place during Lent, leading on to Holly week and acting out the Stations of the Cross, again during these lessons the children were brought into close contact with Christ who loved them so much as to suffer mental and physical torture for them.

What the 'Children's Liturgy of the Word' means



The Children's Liturgy takes place every Sunday at the 11 o'clock Mass.

The term 'Children's Liturgy' refers to the practice of children going to the GP Room during the Liturgy of the Word and gathering to celebrate a separate Liturgy of the Word that is more appropriate to the children's level of understanding.

Two key principles need to be kept in mind when understanding what celebrating Children's Liturgy really is. Firstly, Children's Liturgy is liturgy of the Word, so it is ritual centred on the proclamation and opening up of the scriptures. The children do what the rest of the community is doing at this point of the Mass. They listen to the scriptures proclaimed and applied to contemporary life and respond in various ways, through song, colouring, talk etc... It is an experience of prayer, of dialogue with God.

Secondly, it is the liturgy of the word, ritual prayer and not religious instruction or child minding. Its purpose is not to give the children colouring-in-type activities to keep them busy so the adults can listen to the homily in peace! Because it is a liturgical celebration, all the principles of good liturgy, active participation, clear symbols, etc apply.

Children attending the Mass are always welcome to join the Children's Liturgy of the Word, their own celebration of the Sunday Gospel. It is planned and organized by adults and parents who volunteer for this work in our parish. There are fifteen in the group and each Sunday three or four lead this part of our Sunday Mass. New volunteers are always welcome.

A Passage from India

In 2006 Geraldine & Sarah-Jane O'Callaghan, encouraged and supported by the late and much-missed Tom, spent 8 weeks in New Delhi working with Fr. Jose Mathew, a Don Bosco Priest. In the first weeks of 2009 Fr Jose returned the visit celebrating mass at Sixmilebridge, Kilmurray and Geraldine's home at Rossmanagher where he was able to meet and thank personally some of the principle benefactors of Geraldine. He described in his sermons the appalling circumstances of children who, along with animals, compete for food at the underbelly of the Indian Tiger economy. Due to a combination of poverty, broken homes and lack of educational opportunity over 400,000 children walk and work on the streets of New Delhi every day continuously exposed to drugs, sexual abuse and child trafficking.

Fr Jose described the typical arrival at the main railway station of a child from a far-flung village unaware, unaccompanied and unprotected. Outlining the appalling realities of these children's lives Fr Jose stressed the importance of, "lighting a little lamp rather than blaming the dark". His chief project in this regard is the creation of a "Children's Village" about 30kms from Delhi in the middle of 400 brick-fields where children work from dawn til dusk making bricks that are then hardened by the sun. It is hoped that the village will eventually comprise of a vocational training centre, a health centre, a drug rehabilitation centre and 12 homes to cater for 300 children. This dream is unfolding with the help of people here locally through Geraldine's fund-raising initiatives including coffee mornings, bag-packing, donation boxes and the book-stall at Tim and Bernie Crowes. Fr Jose thanked the people here for keeping the lamp burning spreading warmth and light from Ireland to India. "Give a man a fish and he is fed for a day. Teach him how to fish and he is fed for life."



Friends and Neighbours

The area gatherings continued during 2008. They began on May Eve in the Deerpark area of the parish and continued through the summer evenings in Ballysheen, Rosssroe, Kilmurry.

Once again they turned out to be hugely successful in spite of the fact that a wet summer provided challenges that had to be overcome. Up to 500 people of all ages gathered each evening. The preparations included identifying the site, visiting every house with invitations, preparing an altar for mass; providing the food, music and a history of the local area. These in themselves created a 'buzz'. People were excited with the idea, they came closer together, got to know one another better, identified with the area and with the parish.



The Rosssroe/Rathmore gathering not only was a major local event but through RTE Television Nationwide programme, it became a much talked of event throughout the country. It became known as the mass in the slatted house. It was certainly an extraordinary evening. The weather could not have been worse with thunder, lightning and torrential rain. The 'gathering' could not happen on the hill as originally planned. Without hesitation Pat O'Reilly, the owner, came up with the idea of the slatted house. The rest is history. On the worst night of the year 500 people turned up – we had the mass, the choir, the food, the chat, the music, the dancing. It went into the night and what a night.

RTE recorded the whole thing. The programme that followed was excellent. A lot of other people are now interested in the idea. So, we move into our third year of area gatherings.

The 2009 Programme will again begin on May Eve. Plans are underway with areas and dates. So far the following areas have been identified:

Shaping our Lives

In March the first six week Meaning to Life 'Life Skills' programme took place. We had 12 participants of various backgrounds and experience that made a great group with everyone sharing and encouraging each other. We looked at goal setting, values and belief systems and what inhibits us from fulfilling beliefs and a rewarding values system.

Teenage 'Life Skills' workshops are due to commence over the next few months to help guide and focus teenagers during some of the most important years of their lives. 'If you stand for nothing, you will fall for anything' was never truer than it is today.

What's it all about?

As the song says, 'What *is* it all about?' Well, you would wonder wouldn't you? Have we ever been through such times before? So much uncertainty, so much change, so little security in anything, our jobs, relationships, our trust in other people, are all being challenged daily. After a period when we never had it so good it is all a bit hard to take in. Well, if you have asked yourself these questions, you are not on your own.

Your parish has been trying to address the aching, nagging feeling within so many of us, that something isn't right with society, there's something wrong at the core. Many feel at sea without a paddle, or even an anchor. Are we a society adrift?

The **Meaning to Life Group** came into being in an attempt to strengthen the core values of our parish and community through its people, its sense of place, its spirit. The aim is to strengthen the foundation, the family, our relationships with each other and thereby to strengthen our community.

We have enjoyed a varied programme of events in the past 2 years addressing parenting, spirituality, reconciliation and healing, strengthened by the neighbourhood Masses, all events breaking the mould and reaching out to where the

people are, touching into their real lives. We have a **Life Skills Programme** which has just commenced and a waiting-list already exists for the next one! Our youth have enjoyed the **Burren Challenge** and plenty of adventurous activities are planned again for this year. We are connecting on many levels and those who have been involved have enjoyed the closer sense of belonging created.

Now, more than ever, we must come together to address the challenges of life in a supportive, life-affirming way, wherever you are, whatever place you occupy, whatever stage you're at or crisis in life you are facing.

Mens Group.

What we propose is a group especially dedicated to men, all men, particularly men who are unemployed for whatever reason. So many are losing their jobs, so many are long term unemployed, or not working due to ill health, some are retired, all have a contribution to make. Our younger men experiencing worklessness for the first time would benefit from the wisdom life has given you, if you were prepared to share.

We all know how difficult it is for men to come together and to ask for help. We all understand how hard it is to acknowledge the sense of loss that comes with job loss, the loss of identity, the loss of purpose.

What is proposed is the invitation to come together as a **Men's Group**, our very own **Fir Bolg**, to find out what you would like to develop, what your needs are and how they can be addressed by the parish. Men have always gathered together to go hunting, fight battles, learn skills from each other and to become warriors. Men are designed to travel 15 miles a day in search of food! Outside of sport, modern life does not encourage the type of interactions that all men need and always enjoyed.

Anyone who feels they may have skills to offer to this group is invited to join the initial exploratory meeting, where everyone has the opportunity to listen and to contribute. It will depend on what you want to see happen and what you want to make happen. This is a special place, we have to safeguard the quality of life here and with tens of thousands around the country becoming unemployed in recent times, we have to face up to the pressures in our midst.

The groups activities could be as varied as your own interests; perhaps a Life Skills programme to add to the skills you have already; or a gardening programme; maybe a discussion group; anyone for yoga or meditation?; as the

advert shows us, men do go to Pilates classes!! We are always looking for Contributors for the Parish Newsletter; it would be good to have local news, to mark our family, friends or neighbours in written obituaries: a photographic memory lane exercise: exhibition of crafts, arts, woodturning, engine restoration perhaps: a local history project: creative writing: a group to be on hand to provide DIY for the elderly...The list of possibilities is endless. The point of it all is this, if you feel at a loose end, this could provide purpose, excitement, challenges and friendship by men for men. The idea would be that this Men's Group would meet during the day, when, where and how often to be decided by the men themselves. It could be a resource for the Parish to tap into, to assist in all sorts of ways to enhance the life of the community of Sixmilebridge and Kilmurry.

The wisdom, skills and experiences of a group such as this, of all ages, all interests and none, a means by which men can interact and support each other with a purpose could be a powerful way of strengthening our own place. If we want a community that works, where we know our neighbours and our lives are intertwined in a supportive way, then we have to contribute and we will all benefit.

Helping to Maintain & Develop our Parish Community

The demands on Parish Finances are increasing all the time. We have been trying to reach out to people, where they are, through our Parenting, Friends and Neighbours, Youth Programmes. Caring for elderly is very special to us and people who feel isolated, alone or lonely.

Every effort is being made to create a welcoming and caring Parish Community as well as maintaining and developing a prayerful, worshipping range of services at a high level.

We rarely mention money in this parish but now and again we need to remind ourselves that many of these services including the maintenance of buildings, graveyards etc., requires finance. We will not be able to continue this high level of service and maintenance with increased financial contributions.

We would like to make three suggestions to help us respond to these demands...

1. Use your envelope so we can accurately record your contribution.
2. If you are contributing €250 per year the parish can benefit from tax relief. If you are close to this maybe you could consider bringing it up to €250. This will need to be done before December 31st to be included in the tax year.
3. If you have forgotten to contribute in the past or can afford to contribute a little more we would appreciate if you would consider lightening the burden on the people who do.
